

# CHURCHILL ROAD NAMES

## **BERRY STREET**

Probably named after J. W. Berry who was a Councillor of Ipswich City Council from 1927 to 1934.

## **BREMER STREET**

This street name appears on the 'Plan of the Town of Churchill' Portion number 117 dated c1870.

## **BRISBANE STREET**

This street name appears on the 'Plan of the Town of Churchill' Portion number 117 dated c1870.

## **CHURCHILL STREET**

This street name appears on the 'Plan of the Town of Churchill' Portion number 117 dated c1870.

## **GIBBS STREET**

Probably named after H.V. Gibbs who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 2 May 1958 to 16 April 1964.

## **GLODE AVENUE**

Named after Derek Glode who is a builder and developer.

## **GREENWAY STREET**

Probably named after Ernest Greenway (great-nephew of Francis Greenway). Ernest Greenway came to Australia in 1882 and opened a business as a monumental sculptor and stonemason in Nicholas Street, Ipswich.

## **MEYERS STREET**

Possibly named after Gustov Meyer who was a wine enthusiast.

## **PERRY STREET**

Probably named after Oliver Perry who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council from 1930-1932 and a Councillor from 1917-1924 & 1933-1936.

## **PRINCESS STREET**

This street name appears on the 'Plan of the Town of Churchill' Portion number 117 dated c1870.

## **ROWENA STREET**

This street name appears on the 'Plan of the Town of Churchill' Portion number 117 dated c1870.

## **SHEEHAN LANE**

Possibly named after Michael Sheehan, owner of St. Patrick's Tavern in Little Ipswich in 1846.

## **SPELLEKEN WALK**

The name was suggested by Norm Spelleken to honour his grandfather who came to Australia from Germany as a teenager between 1870 and 1880. He married in Toowoomba and then settled in Ipswich and purchased a block of land the full length of Spencer Street and across to the former Moreton Shire boundary. In 1919 he built the house that still stands today (located 2 houses from the pathway in Maitland Street). He owned the paddock bounded by Kerners Road and Deebing Creek Road and approximately up to the bypass.

## **SPENCER STREET**

Named in 1965 after the late Winston Spencer Churchill.

# LEICHHARDT & ONE MILE ROAD NAMES

## **ASPINALL STREET**

Probably named after J.S. Aspinall who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 13 March 1922 to 5 May 1930.

## **BASS STREET**

A number of streets in this suburb are named after explorers, in this instance the street is named after George Bass.

## **BIRRELL STREET**

Probably named after J. Birrell who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 16 May 1955 to 23 March 1961.

## **BISHOP STREET**

Probably named after J.G. Bishop who was a Councillor of Ipswich City Council from 1942 to 1946.

## **CAFFERKY STREET** - *One Mile*

Possibly named after W.G. Cafferky who was the Chief Officer of the Ipswich Fire Brigade from c1910-1935.

## **CHUBB STREET** - *One Mile*

Named after Charles F. Chubb who was Mayor of Ipswich in 1877 and an Alderman from 22 April 1863 to 30 January 1864, 12 February 1873 to 8 April 1875 and from 14 February 1877 to 16 April 1878.

## **COLEMAN STREET**

Probably named after M. Coleman who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 11 October 1938 to 16 April 1943 and from 10 June 1949 to 1 April 1955.

## **DAMPIER STREET**

Named after the explorer William Dampier.

## **DENMAN STREET**

Possibly named after V. Denman who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 10 June 1949 to 30 May 1963.

## **DIXON STREET**

Probably named after the surveyor Robert Dixon.

## **EYRE STREET**

Named after the explorer Edward John Eyre.

## **FINCH STREET**

Named after Henegh Finch (a surveyor) who was a member of the explorer Mitchell's party.

## **FLINDERS DRIVE**

Named after the explorer Matthew Flinders.

## **FRASER STREET**

Probably named after Charles Fraser, the Colonial Botanist who accompanied Allan Cunningham on his expedition from Brisbane to the Darling Downs.

**GENERAL FOCH STREET - *One Mile***

Probably named after Ferdinand Foch, Marshal of France and Chief of the French general staff. In April 1918 he assumed the unified command of the British, French, and the U.S. Armies.

**JARDINE STREET**

Named after the explorer Francis Lacelles Jardine.

**LARSEN STREET**

Probably named after J.G. Larsen who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 12 June 1952 to 1 April 1955 and from 5 June 1961 to 26 March 1976.

**LAWSON STREET**

Named after the explorer William Lawson.

**LIGHT STREET**

Named after the explorer William Light.

**MARGINSON STREET**

Probably named after E. Marginson who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 12 June 1952 to 26 March 1970.

**MCNAMARA STREET**

Possibly named after W.J. McNamara who was a Councillor of Ipswich City Council from 1949-1952.

**O'KEEFE STREET**

Possibly named after M. O'Keefe, a petitioner for Ipswich to become a Municipality.

**POOLE STREET**

Named after James Poole who was second in command on an exploration trip led by Charles Sturt to Central Australia in 1844.

**ROE STREET**

Named after the explorer John Septimus Roe.

**SIEMONS STREET - *One Mile***

Probably named after G. Siemons who was a Councillor of Brassall Divisional Board from 1897-1899.

**STURT STREET**

Named after the explorer Charles Sturt.

**TOONGARRA ROAD**

Named on 1 March 1940 after the Toongarra Vineyard, which once operated nearby. It was a flourishing business and in 1876, had 80 000 litres of wine in stock. The proprietors were Mr Myer and Mr Isambert who also manufactured soap and candles.
