

COALFALLS ROAD NAMES

HARLIN ROAD

Probably named after Thomas Harlin, M.A., who was one of the first assistant masters of Ipswich Grammar School. He was appointed in 1866 as the mathematics teacher, a position he held until 1868 when he accepted a position as the first headmaster of Brisbane Grammar School. This street name appears on the 'Brassall Bridge Estate Map' dated 1907.

KINGSMILL ROAD

This street name appears on the 'Brassall Bridge Estate Map' dated 1907.

SHENTON STREET

A number of streets in this area are named after Ipswich Mayors. This street is probably named after Samuel Shenton who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1871 and 1889 and a Councillor from 1863-1866, 1870-1873 and 1888-1891. He arrived in Ipswich in 1851 and worked as a contractor and builder, from 1874 to 1899 he worked as an architect. Samuel Shenton designed Garowie in Whitehill Road.

STEPHENSON STREET

A number of streets in this area are named after Ipswich Mayors. The street is probably named after Alfred J. Stephenson, Alfred T. Stephenson or G.S. Stephenson.

Alfred J. Stephenson was the Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1907 and was a Councillor from 1902-1906 & 1908-1914.

Alfred Tully Stephenson was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1912, 1914, 1921-1929, 1933-1938 and a Councillor from 1910-1911, 1913, 1915-1920 & 1930-1932.

G.S. Stephenson was a Councillor of Ipswich City Council in 1917 and 1946-1961.

WILLIAMS LANE

A number of streets in this area are named after Ipswich Mayors. The street is possibly named after either: H.C. Williams who was Mayor of Ipswich in 1868 and was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 1866-1867; or G. Williams who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 18 January 1915-12 February 1917.

WILLIAMS STREET

A number of streets in this area are named after Ipswich Mayors. The street is possibly named after Henry Caleb Williams who was Mayor of Ipswich Municipal Council in 1868 and an Alderman of it from 1866-1867 & 1869. He was a member of the Queensland Parliament in 1868. This street name appears on the 'Brassall Bridge Estate Map' dated 1907. On the 1907 map there is no 's' and it is written as 'William Street'.

WOODEND ROAD NAMES

BALLOW STREET

Probably named after Doctor Keith Ballow who was one of the first purchasers of land in Ipswich.

BOWEN STREET

Possibly named after Sir George Ferguson Bowen who was the first Governor of Queensland (1859-1867).

CAMPBELL ROAD

Possibly named after Donald Campbell whose family was probably the first to settle in the Moreton Bay area once Free Settlement had been declared. Donald Campbell was a blacksmith.

COOPER STREET

Cooper Street is in an area that contains several streets that bear the name of a past Mayor. This street was probably named after James Cooper who was Mayor of Ipswich in 1909 and an Alderman from 3/2/1886-30/1/1887, 7/2/1903-5/2/1912.

DARLING STREET EAST

Probably named after Governor Darling. The Darling Downs were also named after him.

HAWTHORNE STREET

Probably named after Stuart Hawthorne, M.A. who was the first Principal of Ipswich Grammar School, which opened in 1863. Mr Hawthorne was headmaster for seven years

HORAN STREET

Named after Father Horan, parish priest of St Mary's from 1873 to 1924.

MACGREGOR STREET

Possibly named after Sir William MacGregor a Governor of Queensland whose first official visit to Ipswich was on the 28 April 1910 or after the Macgregor family (Alexander Macgregor) who lived at Woodend.

MACRAE STREET

Probably named after John Macrae, M.A. who was appointed as a mathematics teacher at the Ipswich Grammar School in 1868. He was the headmaster of Ipswich Grammar School from 1869-1875.

O'SULLIVAN STREET

Possibly named after Patrick O'Sullivan who represented Ipswich in the first Queensland Legislative Assembly.

PANTON STREET

Named after John Panton of Claremont who had a cotton farm in this area which, was bounded by Panton, Hume and Macgregor Streets. Mr Panton was the founder of the firm Panton & Co and was the first Chairman of the North Australian Club. Claremont in Milford Street was built for him in 1858.

PETTIGREW STREET

A number of streets in this area are named after Ipswich Mayors. This street is probably named after John Pettigrew who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1864 and a Councillor from 1860-1861, 1863-1864 and 1866-1867.

PRYDE STREET

Probably named after Thomas Pryde who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1873 and a Councillor from 1868-1872 and 1874-1877.

SADLIERS CROSSING ROAD NAMES

ABLE STREET

Possibly named after James Able, a petitioner for Ipswich to become a Municipality

BALFOUR STREET

Probably named after the Hon. John Balfour who was a Justice of the Peace in 1860 and one of the first members of the Queensland Legislative Council.

CHALLINOR STREET

Probably named after Dr Henry Challinor who came to Queensland as a doctor on board the immigrant ship 'Fortitude'. He was a member of Queensland Parliament in 1863 and 1867.

CRIBB STREET

Probably named after Benjamin Cribb who was a Councillor of Ipswich Municipal Council from 1862 to 1863 and in 1868.

FARRELLYS LANE

Possibly named after architect John Farrelly who designed 'Knockmoyra'.

FERRETT STREET

Possibly named after Harry Ferrett who was an Alderman of Ipswich City Council from 23 September 1895-30 January 1899, 1 August 1921-7 April 1924 and from 3 November 1924-21 March 1927. He also served on the Bundamba Divisional Board and Bundamba Shire Council.

MACFARLANE STREET

Probably named after John Macfarlane who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1876 and a Councillor from 1873-1875 and 1877-1879.

ROWLAND TERRACE - *Coalfalls & Sadliers Crossing*

Probably named after Doctor Thomas Rowland, a well known Ipswich Doctor who died in 1876.

TALLON STREET

Probably named after Robert Tallon who was Mayor of Ipswich City Council in 1875, 1883 and 1895 and a Councillor from 1873-1874, 1876, 1878-1882, 1884-1885 and 1888-1901. He was a Member of the Brassall Divisional Board from January 1891-1894, 1896-1902 and was Chairman of this Board in 1895 and in 1903. He was Chairman of Brassall Shire Council in 1903 and a Councillor from 1905-1910.
