In 2016 Council endorsed its first Health and Amenity Plan (HAP) as a publically available compliance strategy, also a first for any Australian Council. Council's compliance aim is to protect the community's health and safety, improve amenity, reduce nuisances, and produce positive outcomes for the community.
