1. CONVENOR'S OFFICIAL WELCOME

Greg Chemello, Interim Administrator, welcomed the members to the meeting and delivered an Acknowledgement of Country.

Mr Chemello provided feedback to the members regarding the results of the Memorabilia Survey which was distributed to members on 14 August 2019. Mr Chemello noted that the feedback received was similar to other comments and suggestions Council had received (for example, auctioning the items for charity), however, Council is not in a position to make a determination about what to do with these items at the moment as there are ongoing investigations. Accordingly, in the meantime, the memorabilia items will be stored by Council until such time as a decision is able to be made about next steps.

Mr Chemello invited members to ask other questions about Council. Discussions were had regarding matters such as Council's transformation of its donations and funding programs, Council's approach to arts and culture across the City and Council's preparation for the March 2020 elections.

2. GROUP CHECK-IN

All Community Reference Group members introduced themselves and were asked to answer the question: What excites you about the Ipswich community?:

- Passion from the community




- Good services and programs

3. SITE VISIT TO SAFE CITY, 143 BRISBANE STREET, IPSWICH


The Facilitator and Community Reference Group members undertook a sit visit to Council's Safe City facility. Council's Community Safety and Innovation Manager provided a tour of the facility and talked to members about Council's approach to community safety.

4. ACTIONS FROM LAST MEETING

The Facilitator referred to the Community Reference Group Guidelines and Terms of Reference as the documents governing the structure and function of the Community Reference Group.




The Facilitator referred to the Decision-Making Structure flowchart which was outlined at the last meeting and the process by which input received from the Community Reference Group will be considered by Council when making decisions.



The Facilitator re-introduced the concept of 'Meeting Principles & Practices' and confirmed what was agreed at the last meeting, including the three (3) additional items which were added by members:

- Respect and Value each other's contributions
- Technology = Phones on SILENT
- Agree not to judge others (the CRG is a judgement free meeting)



The Facilitator re-introduced the 'If Ipswich was a group of 100 people' poster and noted that the discussions had by the Community Reference Group should also consider those people in the community that are not currently represented in the room.



The Facilitator re-introduced the scope of the Resilient Communities Community Reference Group, reminding the group to refer to this and check their discussions against this scope.


Regarding meeting agendas, the Facilitator noted that the following discussion about 'Key Priorities for the City of Ipswich' will provide the group an opportunity to shape the nature of future agenda items and topics for subsequent meetings.

The Facilitator also noted that Council had listened to the feedback of members at the last meeting about the frequency of meetings and correspondence between meetings and, as a result, had increased the frequency of meetings to approximately every two (2) months. Further, Council would shortly implement a mechanism/forum by which correspondence and discussion between meetings can occur.

5. KEY PRIORITIES FOR THE CITY OF IPSWICH



The Facilitator noted the various priorities identified by members at the last meeting.



The Facilitator and members then discussed the full list of all those priorities and identified that there were three (3) common/primary priorities:

- 1. Community facilities;
- 2. Resources and information for community organisations (including capacity building); and
 - 3. Arts, cultural understanding and diversity.

Members then determined that these three (3) priorities would be the 'Focus Areas' for the reference group moving forward.





The Facilitator then proposed that in order for the reference group to gain an understanding of the other topics within the scope of the reference group, that a number of agenda items could be chosen and Council representatives would present information about the current work being undertaken in these areas. These topics include:

- Community engagment framework;
- Community development portfolio;
- Library programming, new buildings and customer experience/service;
 - Ipswich data (including 2016 census data and research

regarding the social impact of community centres); and

- Grants and funding programs.

Members agreed that they would like to have presentations and information on the above topics over the course of subsequent meetings.

As a result of the above discussion, the reference group collectively determined a path forward and agreed on focus areas for further discussion at subsequent meetings.

6. ACTION ITEMS & OUTSTANDING AGENDA ITEMS

As the site visit to Council's Safe City facility took longer than expected in this meeting, a number of agenda items were not able to be attended to, including:

- 1. Confidentiality (an outstanding agenda item from the last meeting); and
- 2. Presentation of the Social Impact Assessment being undertaking in relation to the Redbank Plains Community Centre


The group determined that these matters could be revisited at a future meeting.


