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DIVISION 1 PROFILE

This profile provides a 'point-in-time' snapshot on a range of Census topics relating to the residents who live in Division 1 and the City of Ipswich Local Government Area (LGA). This report draws on ABS Census 2021 and 2016 data for Division 1 and uses City of Ipswich as the benchmark.

It should be noted that, for the purposes of this analysis and to show impact, where suburbs have been referenced specifically, information and statistics about these suburbs have been summarised in their entirety (not just the component falling within the division).




LOCATION AND BOUNDARIES

Division 1 is the largest of the four divisions and amalgamates both rural and urban suburbs. The division covers a geographic catchment of 61,148ha (611km²) and is oriented in a east-west direction spanning from White Rock and Redbank Plains to Grandchester and Mount Mort.

It encompasses the suburbs of Blackstone, Calvert, Deebing Heights, Ebenezer, Flinders View, Goolman, Grandchester, Jeebropilly, Mount Mort, Purga, Raceview, Redbank Plains, Ripley, South Ripley, Swanbank, White Rock and Willowbank, and the Ipswich City parts of the localities of Lower Mount Walker, Mount Forbes, Mount Walker West, Mutdapilly and Peak Crossing.

SUBURBAN DEMOGRAPHICS

Division 1 represents a strong mix of rural, urban, industrial and emerging communities. This showcases a true diversity of lifestyles, cultures, age and social groups. The suburb of Redbank Plains is home to the largest share of the division's population with 24,349 people, followed by Raceview with 9,699 people and Flinders View with 5,816 people.

The division's smallest populations were counted in rural areas of Mount Walker West (31 people), Goolman (47 people) and Mount Mort (78 people). No people were recorded in the area's of Swanbank or White Rock in the 2021 census as these area's either had no or low population during the census period.

Division 1 has a young median age at 30 years. The suburbs of Lower Mount Walker and Mount Mort had the oldest median age for local residents.

The average household income was slightly higher in Division 1 than for the City of Ipswich overall. The highest averages recorded in Division 1 suburbs of Deebing Heights, Goolman, South Ripley, and lowest average household income recorded in Willowbank, Raceview and Mutdapilly

Table 2 presents the median age of suburb residents between 2016 and 2021. As many suburb populations are quite small and suburb geographies were refined between the two Census periods it is difficult to provide much analysis of intercensal change. Suburb data for both Census periods are reported for completeness and consistency across all divisional profiles.

Table 3 presents suburb level data for Division 1 and rate of growth where change can be measured across Census periods. It shows the suburbs of Deebing Heights, Redbank Plains Ripley and South Ripley experienced significant population increase. Household income saw the largest changes in Calvert and Goolman, which saw a rise in median household weekly income of between \$328 and \$1,041.

POPULATION AND GENDER



In the 2021 Census, the total resident population for Division 1 was 57,042. Of these, 27,904 were male and 29,137 were female, representing a 48.9% to 51.1% respective gender split. The representation of females in Division 1 in 2021, was marginally higher than the City of Ipswich average, where 50.6% of the population was female.

Note: For the 2021 census the ABS advises that this variable records each person's sex. A person's sex is based on their sex characteristics, such as their chromosomes, hormones and reproductive organs. If sex is not stated it is imputed.



Between 2016 and 2021, the population of Division 1 increased by 13,384 people, or 19.6%, which represents an average annual population change of 3.6% per year.

HOUSEHOLD STRUCTURE

Three-quarters (74.7%) of Division 1 households are family households. This includes a higher proportion of couple families with children, and a similar proportion of one-parent families. There was a lower proportion of lone person households and a similar proportion of couple households without children.


ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER PEOPLES

Division 1 is home to 3,102 residents (5.4%) who identified as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander in 2021. Between 2016 and 2021, the number of residents identifying as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander increased by 1,355 people.

COUNTRY OF BIRTH




In 2021, 20.8% of people in Division 1 were born overseas, compared with 21.7% in the City of Ipswich. After New Zealand and United Kingdom, the next most common countries of birth in Division 1 were India (where 914 residents were born) and Samoa (where 758 residents were born).



LANGUAGE SPOKEN AT HOME



In Division 1, 13.7% of people spoke a language other than English at home in 2021, which was a slightly lower proportion than the City of Ipswich overall (14.1%). There are 59 languages other than English spoken by Division 1 residents.

The dominant language spoken at home, other than English, in Division 1 was Samoan, with 2.6% of the population, or 1,485 people speaking this language at home (a larger proportion compared to the City of Ipswich 1.9%). Filipino/Tagalog was the second most popular language spoken at home by 476 people.

Figure 5. City of Ipswich and Division 1 residents who speak a language other than English at home in 2016 and 2021 (%)





Figure 6. Top 20 languages, other than English, spoken at home in Division 1 from 2021



NEED FOR ASSISTANCE




In Division 1, there were 3,464 people (or 6.1% of residents across all age groups who responded) that reported needing help in their day-to-day lives due to a 'profound or severe core activity limitation'.

This was a percentage increase from 2016.

Day-to-day core activities are defined as including self-care, body movement and communication that are reported as limited because of a disability, long-term health condition or old age.

Note: A person's reported need for assistance in the Census is a subjective assessment. As such, this data should be treated with caution.

VOLUNTEERS



In Division 1, 4,354 residents (or 10.3%) undertook voluntary work for an organisation or group. This was a smaller portion than City of Ipswich.

Figure 8. Division 1 residents who participated in voluntary work in 2016 and 2021





Figure 9. City of Ipswich and Division 1 proportion of residents' volunteer participation in 2021



RELIGION



Overall, 51.0% of Division 1 residents reported having a religious affiliation in 2021, while 41.7% had no religion and 7.5% did not answer the question. The largest single religion in Division 1 was Western (Roman) Catholic (identified by 15.7% of residents).

Figure 10. Division 1 top 12 religions ranked by size, 2021





Figure 11. Residents' religious affiliations in Division 1 and City of Ipswich in 2021




EDUCATION





QUALIFICATIONS



Division 1 had 21,273 residents with an educational qualification representing 50.3% the population aged 15 years and over in 2021.

Compared to the City of Ipswich, Division 1 had a slightly larger percentage of persons with no qualifications (41.7%) and vocational qualifications (28.0%). Division 1 had a smaller percentage of persons with Bachelor or higher degrees (12.7%).

Figure 14. Division 1 residents' highest education qualification achieved in 2016 and 2021





Figure 15. Residents' highest education qualification attainment in Division 1 and City of Ipswich, 2016 and 2021



EMPLOYMENT




In 2021, there were 27,787 residents of working age in Division 1.

Of the Division 1 labour force:

- 15,964 people worked full-time (57.5%)
- 7,470 people worked part-time (26.9%)
- 2,525 people were employed, away from work (9.1%)
- 1,828 were unemployed (6.5%).

INDUSTRY



The top 5 employment industries for working residents of Division 1 in 2021 were Health Care and Social Assistance (16%); Retail Trade (9.9%); Manufacturing (9.6%); Public Administration and Safety (9.5%); and Construction (7.8%).

Figure 17. Industries of employment for workers in Division 1 and the City of Ipswich, 2016 and 2021





Figure 18. Division 1 workers by industry of employment, 2021

Figure 19. Occupation groups for residents of Division 1 and the City of Ipswich, 2016 and 2021





Figure 20. Occupations of workers based in Division 1, 2021



METHOD OF TRAVEL TO WORK



In 2021, the vast majority of working residents from Division 1 travelled to work by car, either as a driver or as a passenger. There were 677 working residents from Division 1 who caught public transport to work (3.0%), contrast with 19,392 people (74.7%) who used a private vehicle.

Figure 21. Number of working residents by method of travel to work Division 1, 2021





Figure 22. Method of travel to work, Division 1 and the City of Ipswich, 2021



INCOME




Division 1 shares a similar income distribution to the City of Ipswich. In 2021, 37.0% of residents aged 15 years and over earned \$1,000 or more per week.

Of Division 1 residents aged 15 years and over:

- 9,771 (or 24.8%) were in the lowest quartile earning less than \$388 weekly
- 9,320 (or 23.7%) were in the medium lowest quartile earning \$389 to \$787 per week
- 12,057 (or 30.6%) were in the medium highest quartile earning \$788 to \$1,424 per week
- 8,244 (or 20.9%) were in the highest personal income quartile earning \$1,425 and over.




In 2021, 51.5% of Division 1 households earned a weekly income above \$1,500, consistent with the City of Ipswich overall (50.9%). Analysis of the distribution of households by income quartile shows strength in middle household income quartiles, with a lesser proportion of households in the highest income quartile and a lesser proportion in the lowest income quartile.

Division 1 had the following household incomes dissection in 2021:

- 3,554 households were in the lowest quartile earning less than \$853 per week
- 5,217 households (or 29.6%) were in the 'medium lowest' quartile earning between \$854 to \$1,665
- 5,354 households (30.4%) were in the 'medium highest' quartile earning \$1,666 to \$2,791
- 3,502 households (19.9%) were in the highest quartile, earning \$2,792 and over.

The most significant change in Division 1 between 2016 and 2021 was medium lowest quartile which showed an increase of 1,662 households.



Figure 26. Proportion of household weekly income quartiles in Division 1 and City of Ipswich, 2016 and 2021




HOUSING TENURE



In 2021, 51.0% of households in Division 1 had purchased or fully owned their home while 40.1% were renting privately, and 2.2% were in social housing.


CAR OWNERSHIP



Division 1 had more households (91.0%) that owned at least one car in 2021. Overall, 31.1% of the households owned one car; 39.1% owned two cars; and 20.6% owned three cars or more.

There were still 719 households (3.6%) in Division 1 that did not have access to a motor vehicle, which was a smaller percentage than the City of Ipswich average (4.9%).
